Course Description

The course will examine Canadian politics with a particular emphasis on the formal institutions of the Canadian State. Throughout the term students will examine key institutions such as the constitution, federalism, and parliament. The course will also look at some of the key cleavages in Canadian politics as well as the bureaucracy and political parties, elections, and interest groups. The course will basically follow a lecture format, although guest speakers and video presentations may also be used. The course has a seminar component in which all students must be registered. This seminar will provide opportunities for small group discussions of issues related to the course material. Some time at the beginning of classes may be given to a discussion of contemporary Canadian political issues.

Grades

Students should be aware that writing and the grading thereof will be a factor in the evaluation of student work.

Ouizzes: 25%

There will be five quizzes throughout the course, but only the grades of the best three will be used. The quizzes will test students' knowledge of the course material covered in the assigned readings as well as lectures. Quizzes will be multiple choice and take place at the beginning of class. Students will have 20 minutes to complete the quiz. The first two missed quizzes will be treated as the quiz scores to be dropped.

Term Paper 30%

A list of term paper topics will be provided in class at least six weeks prior to the due date. Other topics may be pursued only with the prior written consent of the instructor. The papers will be evaluated on writing as well as content. A hard copy of the paper must be submitted by the beginning of class on March 29.

There will be a penalty of 3 percentage points for every day a paper is late. Papers not submitted in class will be considered late. Papers more than two weeks late will not be accepted.

Final Exam 45% (Registrar scheduled April 15-27)

Supporting Documentation and the Use of a Statutory Declaration

As stated in the University Calendar:

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, third party letter of support or a statutory declaration etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>). This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Several registered Commissioners for Oaths are available to students at no charge, on campus. For a list of locations to access a Commissioners for Oaths, visit <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>).

Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Please note that while the form of supporting documentation provided is at the discretion of the student, the instructor has the discretion not to accept the supporting documentation if it does not corroborate the reason(s) given for the exemption/special request.

Absence From a Mid-term Examination:

Students who are absent from a scheduled term test or quiz for legitimate reasons are responsible for contacting the instructor via email within 48 hours of the missed test to discuss alternative arrangements. A copy of this email may be requested as proof of the attempt to contact the instructor. Any student who fails to do so forfeits the right to a makeup test.

Deferral of a Final Examination:

Deferral of a final examination can be granted for reasons of illness, domestic affliction, and unforeseen circumstances, as well as to those with three (3) final exams scheduled within a 24-hour period. Deferred final exams will not be granted to those who sit the exam, who have made travel arrangements that conflict with their exam, or who have misread the examination timetable. The decision to allow a deferred final exam rests not with the instructor but with Enrolment Services. Instructors should, however, be notified if you will be absent during the examination. Appeals:

If a student has a concern about the course or a grade they have been assigned, they must first discuss their concerns with the instructor. If this does not resolve the matter, the student then proceed with an academic appeal. The first step in an academic appeal is to set up a meeting with the Department Head. Appeals must be requested within 15 days of receipt of the graded assignment.

FOIP legislation requires that instructors maintain the confidentiality of student information. In practice, this means that student assignment and tests cannot be left for collection in any public place without the consent of the student. It also means that grades cannot be distributed via email. Final exams are kept by instructors but can be viewed by contacting them or the main office in the Department of Political Science. Any uncollected assignments and tests meant to be returned will be destroyed after six months from the end of term; final examinations are destroyed after one year.
