Course Description

This engaging and highly interactive course will provide foundational knowledge and will develop the skills essential for further study in International Indigenous Studies. With the goal of contributing to the co-creation of positive relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples, we will seek to understand Indigenous ways of knowing, particularly relationships to place, in relationship with Western/Euro-Canadian ways.

So that we will be informed participants in equitable relationship-building, we will deepen our understanding of how the differences between Indigenous and Western ways have impacted historical and contemporary relationships, especially in terms of education/research and of land/resource development. We will begin by growing our understanding of Indigenous communities and perspectives in southern Alberta and then move to the North American and broader international contexts, considering the histories and perspectives of, for example, the Yolngu, Maori, Saami, and Mayan peoples, and exploring as we do the significance of treaties and of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

Reaching these goals in this course will involve: learning with elders through classroom visits; guest talks from academics with specialized knowledge of specific International Indigenous communities; participation in (optional) field trips to significant local historical/cultural sites; participation in local Indigenous cultural events (several in conjunction with the Native Centre); building our repertoires of accurate knowledge regarding the histories and perspectives of Indigenous peoples; engaging with different

forms of knowledge and expression (readings, films, websites); and, most importantly, engaging with each other.

Schedule of Lectures and Readings

This course is grounded in relationship-building and involves extensive large and small-group discussion. There will be times that more time is needed than originally expected to grow our understanding. As such, it is difficult to maintain a strict schedule regarding what we will do on what day. Assignment due dates are firm, and the schedule will never be 'sped up' (i.e., participants will never be asked to prepare earlier than originally scheduled.) In addition to information provided in class, the schedule of readings and activities will be posted on Blackboard and will be regularly updated; it is the participant's responsibility to check the schedule regularly and be prepared for each class.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. This includes assignments submitted in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media, and material taken from such sources.
