Course description: Experiential exploration, consideration, and application of Indigenous ecological knowledge, philosophies, and contemporary issues. There is no prerequisite for this course, however knowledge of Indigenous ways of knowing is an asset. This course may not be repeated for credit. Students are expected to attend field trips, as they form the basis for self-reflexivity papers and the main class project.

Course objectives: The overarching aim of teachings during our time together is to learn about ways that the environment is continuously communicating with and between all beings using Indigenous ways of knowing, learning, and connecting.

Learning outcomes: Students come away from the course with a deeper sense of Indigenous cosmology; likewise, with tools to affect environmental change that incorporate the TRCs (2015) “Calls to Action” and urban planning on biodiversity.

4. Please DO NOT email me your assignments.
5. Group submission of the Class Project is required to pass the course. Group members are expected to do their share of work; should this not be the case, group members will be asked to write a statement explaining problematic situations. A group meeting may be called with the instructor to discuss and resolve issues. Collegial and full participation is expected of all students.
6. Field trips take place as scheduled including during inclement weather. However, schedule may be subject to change due to weather and unexpected events.
7. Field trip protocols (recordings and photographs) will be discussed in class.

Course and University Policies

- Attendance may not be assessed on its own as a grade component: refer to Calendar Section E.3. Attendance. <http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/e-3.html>. However, attendance will be taken on field trips to ensure student safety and correlation with assignment submissions.
- Post all assignments to D2L’s dropbox before midnight on their due dates—D2L date stamps submission. Electronic failure is not a viable reason for lateness. A hard copy of

assignments (typed) can be handed-in during class hours on their due dates. Students are encouraged to complete all assignments to maximize their passing grades.

- Extra-credit assignments are not available for this course.
- **A late penalty of 5% per day** is applied **after midnight on the due date of each individual assignment**. For example, assignment #1 is due July 16, thus should the assignment be submitted on July 17, its grade value drops 5% before grading. Should the assignment be submitted on July 18, its grade value drops 10% before grading, and so forth. The late penalty applies to business days only and not weekends.
- Please email a full day ahead of time by e-mail should extenuating circumstances arise that impede the submission of assignments on their due dates. I expect that you will respect my need to plan my workload; also the nature of a face-paced 6-week course The submission of assignments by their due dates alleviates stress as well as provides immediate feedback.
- If life circumstances or illness intervene, I may ask for documentation and refer you to the Program Co-ordinator of Indigenous Studies for advice, particularly if you have missed several classes.
- The Group Project (group submission and group presentation) combined is worth 40% of the course grade. It is a terminal project and can weigh over 10%. Please refer to Calendar, G. Examinations and Tests: <http://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/g.html>.
- The Group Project is especially important, as students contribute to affect environmental change. Students who do not submit their share of work will be penalized either individually or as a group depending on the situation and possible group feedback.
- There is no mid-term exam or a Registrar scheduled exam. The final term exam is scheduled for August 15 during regular class time.

- Students are expected to participate in class discussions having completed their readings. Our time together is limited and ought to be focused on education, sharing of knowledge, and completing course requirements.
- Computers and other electronic devices are not permitted during the final exam.
- There are no additional costs or supplementary fees, however students are expected to make their way to field trip sites on their own accord. Past courses have seen students arrange car pools among themselves. Students will be asked to contribute (if possible) to the ceremonial feast on the last field trip.
