COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This lecture course will provide an intensive introduction to Canadian government and politics. By the end of the course, students will be familiar with the institutional “machinery” of Canadian government and politics (the Constitution, Parliament, and federalism) and Canadian electoral processes (the electoral system, the party system, and voter behaviour). This course will also introduce students to key moments in the development of Canadian politics, as well as scholarly debates about how best to understand and explain the political process in Canada.

COURSE OBJECTIVES & LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Students who commit themselves to the readings, tutorial discussions, lectures, and assignments in this course will finish the course with (a) the ability to clearly describe the major institutions and processes of Canadian government, (b) the ability to articulate key debates about Canadian politics and an understanding of how the key arguments in these debates can be tested, (c) improved research and writing skills, and (d) an increased ability to think like a social scientist!

Assignments (30%): These assignments are intended to refine the research and analysis skills needed to understand Canadian politics, while also connecting class material to ongoing events in Canadian politics. The details for each assignment are available on D2L; I will also discuss each assignment in class before it is due. All assignments will be submitted to the instructor electronically via D2L.

- 1) Leaders debate and Canadian political development. In this assignment, you will write a short paper on the Canadian federal leaders debate, assessing the strategies and performance of each leader and making connections between the debate and key themes in Canadian political development explored in class. This paper will be approximately 750 words in length. It is due on **October 22nd at 11:59pm.**
- 2) Book review. In this assignment, you will write a short review of a recent book in Canadian political science; I will provide a list of books on D2L. Your review will summarize the arguments and evidence of the book and offer an analysis of how the book contributes to Canadian political science. The book review will be approximately 1000 words in length. It is due on **November 21th at 11:59pm.**

Unit Tests (40%): These 60-minute, closed-book, in-class tests will take place on October 8 and October 29. The tests will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions related to course lectures and readings. More details will be provided in class and on D2L.

Final Exam (30%): This 120-minute, closed-book exam will take place during the exam period. The exam will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions along with one or more synthetic essay questions. No aids will be permitted during the final examination. More details will be provided in class and on D2L.

Supporting Documentation and the Use of a Statutory Declaration

As stated in the University Calendar:

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, third party letter of support or a statutory declaration etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at ucalgary.ca/registrar). This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Several registered Commissioners for Oaths are available to students at no charge, on campus. For a list of locations to access a Commissioner for Oaths, visit ucalgary.ca/registrar).

Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Please note that while the form of supporting documentation provided is at the discretion of the student, the instructor has the discretion not to accept the supporting documentation if it does not corroborate the reason(s) given for the exemption/special request.

Absence From a Mid-term Examination:

Students who are absent from a scheduled term test or quiz for legitimate reasons are responsible for contacting the instructor via email within 48 hours of the missed test to discuss alternative arrangements. A copy of this email may be requested as proof of the attempt to contact the instructor. Any student who fails to do so forfeits the right to a makeup test.

Deferral of a Final Examination:

Deferral of a final examination can be granted for reasons of illness, domestic affliction, and unforeseen circumstances, as well as to those with three (3) final exams scheduled within a 24-hour period. Deferred final exams will not be granted to those who sit the exam, who have made travel arrangements that conflict with their exam, or who have misread the examination timetable. The decision to allow a deferred final exam rests not with the instructor but with

Enrolment Services. Instructors should, however, be notified if you will be absent during the examination. Appeals:
