COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This is a lecture course that explores the character of representative politics in a number of post industrial democracies. We are particularly interested in trying to understand the apparent decline in support for formal political institutions evident in many of these countries. To do so, we consider stability and change in the attitudes of voters, the operation of political institutions, and how these factors interact.

The course schedule outlining weekly topics is below. While departures will occasionally occur, the lectures will generally follow that schedule. The assigned reading is from the texts available at the University of Calgary Bookstore and journal articles available from the University of Calgary Library. Supplementary materials can be found in the footnotes and endnotes for each chapter of the text.

After completing the course, students will:

- Understand critical features of democracy in post-industrial states;
- Have developed a sophisticated understanding of important institutional elements of democracy as well as key concepts such as representation, accountability and responsiveness;
- Have engaged in comparative political research using a range of methodological approaches and resources;
- Have honed their research and essay writing skills.

1. Quizzes 30%

There will be three 'closed book' in-class quizzes. Only the grades of the best two will count toward your final grade. Students will have 15 minutes to complete the quiz. A missed quiz will be treated as the quiz score to be dropped. Subsequent missed quizzes may be retaken if appropriate documentation excusing the absence is made available to the instructor. Please confirm a score has been recorded for each quiz you sit once the instructor indicates that the results have been posted.

The quizzes test students' knowledge of the course material covered in the assigned readings as well as the lectures and discussions. The first quiz covers material up until the previous lecture. Subsequent quizzes cover classes from the last quiz to the lecture preceding the quiz.

2. Research essay (30% of final grade)

You will complete a 3000-word (excluding notes and bibliography) research essay using the APA reference style (https://ucalgary.ca/ssc/files/ssc/wss_apa_2014.pdf). The essay is due in the course D2L Dropbox by **21:00 Hrs, Friday, March 23rd, 2018**. Essays received after **21:00 Hrs, Monday, March 26th, 2018** will incur a grade penalty of 3% for each day they are late, beginning at **21:01 Hrs, March 26th, 2018**. Essay Topics and instructions will be made available on the course website under 'Assignments.'

Requests for extensions due to illness or similar reasons *must be made to the Instructor before the due date and must be supported by suitable documentation, such as a note from a physician in the case of ill-health. Always keep an electronic backup copy of your paper to ensure against loss or other difficulties.*

Whereas most books and journal articles available through the University of Calgary library will have passed many rigorous tests of their scholarship and veracity, this is not the case for websites, which can be published with little or no checking of their content. While many websites offer useful and trustworthy information, you should not accept at face value everything you read or see on the net.

Writing

Written assignments are often required in Political Science courses. The quality of writing, including but not limited to such elements as grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, clarity and organization, will all be considered in assigning a grade to submitted work.
