

UNDERSTANDING #JUSTICEFORCOLTEN THROUGH INDIGENOUS SYSTEMS OF KNOWLEDGE

Dr. Shalene Jobin, University of Alberta

About the Talk:

In this talk I explore how Indigenous ontological resources are needed to think through complex issues in society: social, culture, economic, legal, and political. On February 9, 2018, a jury's verdict of not guilty for second-degree murder—as well as not guilty for manslaughter—was delivered for the death of a twenty-two year old boy named Colten Boushie from Red Pheasant First Nation. The R v. Stanley case represents the intersections of race, colonialism, private property, the criminal justice system, and fractured relationships.

About the Speaker:

SHALENE JOBIN is an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Native Studies and Director of the Indigenous Governance and Partnership program at the University of Alberta. Dr. Jobin is the co-creator and founding Academic Director of the Indigenous Partnership Development Program, a partnership between Executive Education and the Faculty of Native Studies, University of Alberta. Shalene is Cree from her mother (Wuttunee family) and Métis from her father (Jobin family) and is a member of Red Pheasant Cree First Nation. Shalene has published in numerous journal and edited book collections and recently finished a manuscript titled *Nehiyawak Narratives: Upholding Indigenous Economic Relationships*.
